The COVID-19 vaccination program began in Ontario on December 14 with clinics in Toronto and Ottawa, and in BC on December 15 with the BC Provincial Health Officer, Dr. Bonnie Henry, present as the first vaccine was administered. A handful of long-term care homes were selected to participate in the launch of phase one of the COVID-19 vaccine rollout, and we were so pleased that five Sienna care communities located in the Toronto area and in BC were asked to provide volunteer team members.

In an emotional day for all involved, we witnessed those who have tirelessly battled COVID-19 for nearly a year, make an important decision to further protect the health and safety of residents, team members and all Canadians. We are thrilled to wrap up this unprecedented year with such optimism and look forward to further rollout of the vaccine!
